
Director's Corner

It's almost fall, and the library has been working on projects that will improve services for all our patrons.

In the last newsletter, we announced the hiring of four new staff: Amy Blasi, Mikaela Brown, Melanie Lambert and Jessica Pennella. Each has begun to focus on key services (as detailed in the accompanying

clever diagram). They have received catalog training, worked with the children's coordinator at James V. Brown Library, and became GED trainers.

Rebecca Aldinger has also volunteered to work on GED training.

Another completed project is a comprehensive inventory of the library's collection, ensuring that the online catalog is correct and up-to-date.

We're also excited to announce the return of the Children's Story Hour. Anyone interested in participating should register on the library's webpage or at the library. Story Hours will be offered via an online format to ensure safe social

> distancing. Part of this year's Story Hours will include a takehome bag of activities connected to each story. Bags can be returned to the library to be refilled for the next reading.

> The second-floor storage room has been cleared and new shelving added. In working with technology coordinator Joshua Hudson at J.V. Brown Library, a patron counter installed on all public computers will eliminate the need for patrons to sign a log sheet when using the computers. The number of users counted each year will be included in the

annual report.

Mary Ellen Minnier is re-painting the main sign on the front of the library – as well as an older version of the library sign discovered in the library's attic. The older sign will be placed on the side of the building near the door to the Children's Room.

The library exterior was recently power-washed to prepare for painting the trim. More information will follow about interior work and the groups and individuals responsible for enhancing the look of the library.

We have processed 180 new materials during the summer months to be added to our collection.

Annual Meeting

The nominating committee recommended Bonnie Barry as treasurer for the two-year term of 2020 to 2022, and Teri Klem for vice-president for 2020 to 2022. These recommendations were approved.

Treasurer Bonnie Barry presented a Profit and Loss Statement covering July 2019 through June 2020, showing a gross income of \$49,835.65, total expenses of \$46,374.47, for a net income for the fiscal year of \$3,461.18. The Statement includes a transfer of \$40,399.76 to the Sullivan County Library. The Balance Sheet for June 30, 2020, shows total assets and liability of \$41,103.63

A \$5,000 grant from United Way will help with adult and children's programs during the coming year. The Community Foundation for the Twin Tiers (CFTT) investment was now over \$12,500 and represents a long-term way to invest in the library.

Despite the disruptions and quarantine issues of Covid-19, life goes on. The county leadership combined with the creative talents of local artists Karen Black and Dan Curry to use United Way funds to sponsor two summer-long programs.

Karen held virtual art classes online, while Dan conducted in-person outdoor classes at Kast Pond and the Keystone Lodge in Muncy Valley. There was good attendance all summer.

The Last-Friday poetry sessions at Winterland Winery have been prospering, albeit with fewer in attendance. But the interest is there and we hope to see more of our friends with the coming of more "normal" times.

Another American Native archeology program is planned for November, so come hit the fields and find some artifacts. More information will follow.

Hopefully, restraints will be relaxed so that other programs can be realized.

• Little Free Libraries

The two current Little Free library locations in Laporte and World's End State Park are seeing a lot of activity. We thank Challa O'Conner and her family for keeping both libraries stocked – and also a thank-you to the library for providing the books. A third unit, for Ricketts Glen State Park, will be ready for installation later this month. Construction on the fourth unit, to be located at McCarty Mercantile in Hillsgrove, has been started but no completion date set. Another unit is planned for the Shunk General Store, with discussions being held about the design.

\$1,198 for the Little Free Libraries remains unspent, including a donation of \$500 for construction materials. A kit costing \$249 was available for Ricketts Glen, and we could purchase one for the Hillsgrove store that would look like a covered bridge. Funds were allocated for these kits.
